**PUBLIC HEALTH EMERGENCY RESPONSE**

An evaluation of the department's Emergency Preparedness Plan resulted in a score of 94% which far exceeded the 60% required to receive federal funding. The health department has made progress in preparing for public health threats as reflected in that score. However, as public health is facing ever evolving public health risks, dollars to sustain this level of preparedness and expand upon preparedness is decreasing. As of August 2011, the Center for Disease Control's (CDC) planning priorities have changed to a more comprehensive planning focus and a new scoring system. CDC has developed fifteen public health capabilities to target, develop plans for and exercise those plans during the next five year cycle.

A new web based software system called CEMP which stands for Comprehensive Emergency Management Program was introduced this year. This program will improve the efficiency and effectiveness of planning and will close the gap between government requirements by allowing more standardization and flexibility. The system will reflect the changes in the government requirements thus allowing a more focused approach in line with the new priorities set by the CDC.

The unit's ultimate goal has been and will continue to be as prepared as possible for any public health emergency affecting this county. Volunteer recruitment, retention, and agency partnerships remain a high priority since no one agency can handle a serious disaster without the assistance of partnering agencies and prepared citizens.

**HEALTH PROMOTION SERVICES DIVISION**

The goal of Health Promotion Services is to educate citizens about the positive effects of a healthy lifestyle and to encourage them to alter lifestyles through changes in behavior. Lifestyle changes are facilitated through the combination of efforts to enhance awareness, change behavior, and by creating environments that support favorable health practices. These lifestyle changes often require addressing physical, mental, and social issues contributing to the behavior.

Health Promotion Services administers programs with schools, community organizations, collaborations, citizens, state and regional programs, coalitions, and media. Health Promotion collaborates with many county agencies, organizations, and community members to prepare and offer education. This year the primary health promotion focus has been implementing tobacco prevention and cessation programs, continuing outreach and education with breast and cervical cancer programs, implementing social marketing campaigns, conducting health needs assessments and community health plan development, and implementing sexual health education programs.
