PUBLIC HEALTH EMERGENCY RESPONSE

Hurricane Sandy, wildfires, severe summer heat and the severe drought are some of the natural disasters of 2012. These disasters are continual reminders of the importance of emergency preparedness. This division has strived to be as prepared as possible for any public health emergency affecting this county. Responding to any natural or manmade disaster takes the whole community, not one agency or individual can do it alone.

The experience gained from large scale disasters such as Hurricane Sandy emphasize the importance of having individual and family preparedness plans. The division has always used National Preparedness Month to inform the public of this need and where to find resources to assist with planning. We continue to recruit volunteers for the Medical Reserve Corps (MRC) increasing those numbers from 198 to 221 volunteers in this last 12 month period. Every MRC member and health department staff are trained to have emergency plans at home.

The division continues to collaborate with others, encompassing agencies across the entire metro St. Louis region. Depending on the type and location of the disaster this collaboration builds in the possibility of immediate help followed by state and federal assistance.

HEALTH PROMOTION SERVICES DIVISION

The goal of Health Promotion Services is to educate citizens about the positive effects of a healthy lifestyle and to encourage them to alter lifestyles through changes in behavior. Lifestyle changes are facilitated through the combination of efforts to enhance awareness, change behavior, and by creating environments that support favorable health practices. These lifestyle changes often require addressing physical, mental, and social issues contributing to the behavior.

Health Promotion Services administers programs with schools, community organizations, collaborations, citizens, state and regional programs, coalitions, and media. Health Promotion collaborates with many county agencies, organizations, and community members to prepare and offer education. This year the primary health promotion focus has been implementing tobacco prevention and cessation programs, continuing outreach and education with breast and cervical cancer programs, collaborating and planning to address health priorities in Madison County, and implementing sexual health education programs.
