PUBLIC HEALTH EMERGENCY RESPONSE

The goal of this division is to ensure the health department as a whole monitors for and is prepared to respond decisively to: terrorist attacks, new and emerging infectious diseases or disasters. This is accomplished in a collaborative effort with other Local, State and/or Federal responding agencies and Private Citizens. The type of response and collaboration is determined by the type and extent of the event, each entity doing what they do best, taking the lead as their area of expertise is called upon.

This division started in July 2002 and has been propelling forward ever since. Its success over time is demonstrated in the traditional and non-traditional relationships the agency has built with partners such as law enforcement, emergency management, fire service, DOJ, SIUE, area hospitals, schools and various partners across the river and region since diseases know no boundaries. Other successes include rebuilding of the basic infrastructure of the health department: moving from paper to electronic disease reporting, adding radio communications and needed frequencies, ensuring staff education continues in new technologies, leading regional exercises in collaboration with St Louis University School of Public Health, Institute for Bio-Security (etc). These achievements are made toward building for a better-prepared community to withstand the public health threats here today and those coming tomorrow. It is not a job this department can do alone. The department sincerely thanks our partners.

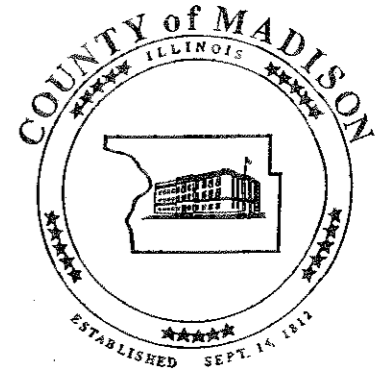

HEALTH PROMOTION SERVICES DIVISION

The goal of Health Promotion Services is to educate citizens about the positive effects of a healthy lifestyle and to encourage them to alter lifestyles through changes in behavior. Lifestyle changes are facilitated through the combination of efforts to enhance awareness, change behavior, and by creating environments that support good health practices. These lifestyle changes often require addressing physical, mental, and social issues contributing to the behavior.

Health Promotion Services administers programs with schools, community organizations, collaborations, citizens, state and regional programs, coalitions, and media. Health Promotion collaborates with many county agencies, organizations, and community members to prepare and offer education. This year the primary health promotion focus has been implementing a comprehensive tobacco prevention program, assisting in the implementation of a countywide youth alcohol initiative, continuing outreach
