**PUBLIC HEALTH EMERGENCY RESPONSE**

The goal of this division is to ensure the health department as a whole monitors for and is prepared to respond decisively to: terrorist attacks, new and emerging infectious diseases or disasters. This is accomplished in a collaborative effort with other Local, State and/or Federal responding agencies and Private Citizens. The type of response and collaboration is determined by the type and extent of the event, each entity doing what they do best, taking the lead as their area of expertise is called upon. Collaborative relationships are maintained with law enforcement, emergency management, fire service, DOJ, businesses, Lewis and Clark, SIUE, area hospitals, schools and various other partners here and across the river.

Each year the health department is involved with many kinds of exercises aimed at practicing our ability to respond to real world events. Every year time is spent recruiting and training volunteers to be ready to assist with those large scale real world events. Consequently, exercises for the 2008 year were geared toward practicing the health department's response to pandemic flu, bioterrorism and natural disaster (earthquake).

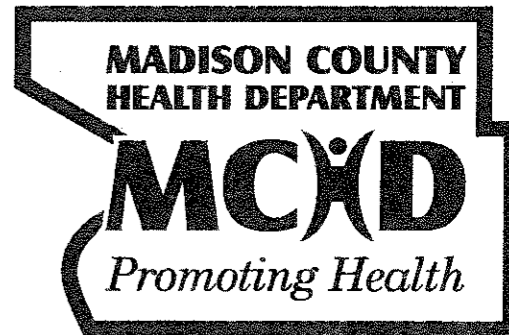

**HEALTH PROMOTION SERVICES DIVISION**

The goal of Health Promotion Services is to educate citizens about the positive effects of a healthy lifestyle and to encourage them to alter lifestyles through changes in behavior. Lifestyle changes are facilitated through the combination of efforts to enhance awareness, change behavior, and by creating environments that support favorable health practices. These lifestyle changes often require addressing physical, mental, and social issues contributing to the behavior.

Health Promotion Services administers programs with schools, community organizations, collaborations, citizens, state and regional programs, coalitions, and media. Health Promotion collaborates with many county agencies, organizations, and community members to prepare and offer education. This year the primary health promotion focus has been implementing a tobacco prevention and cessation program, assisting with youth alcohol prevention initiatives and safety programs,
